
Administrative Services


2025-2026 Adopted Budget

- 3 Vacant Positions Eliminated
- 4 Filled Positions Eliminated
- Reduction of \$266,000 in expense accounts
- Reduction of \$20,000 for part-time position funding
- 9% Salary Saving Rate
- Preserved 1 Sr Project Coordinator position

• Total: \$3,097,445

Mayor's Budget Priorities

- Urgently House Angelenos
- Keep Angelenos Safe
- Make LA Shine
 - Preparing for 2026 FIFA World Cup, 2027 Super Bowl, and 2028 Olympic & Paralympic Games
- Foster Opportunity
 - Enhance access to good jobs, small business growth
- Bolster Crisis Responses
 - Maintain the City's stability & prosperity through swift response
 - Proactive emergency preparedness.



Challenges

- Projected \$263.2 million City overspend
- External factors (wildfires, shutdown)
- 11 positions lost
- Includes 4 filled positions lost this year
- Cut of \$101,124 base operating budget



Challenges Cont...

- NEA support ratio will increase to 1:11
- Staffing levels may lead to burnout
- Mandated \$154,872 reduction exercise
- 9% Salary Saving Rate
- Non-revenue generating department



FY 2026-2027 Budget Proposal Breakdown

- Baseline Funding: \$3,250,946
- **Requesting:** \$899,909
 - \$364,909 to restore four (4) Project Coordinator Positions
 - \$35,000 for Neighborhood Council Zoom Licenses
 - \$500,000 for 2027 Neighborhood Council Elections Outreach Campaign
- Total Budget Proposal: \$4,150,855



Request 1: Neighborhood Council Support Staff

- Restore four (4) Project Coordinator positions.
 - Two positions prevent layoffs;
- Improve service and prevent burnout.
- Stabilize ratio from 1:11 to a manageable 1:8.
- Shifts from reactive to proactive support.



Request 2: Zoom Licenses for Neighborhood Councils

- Standardized Zoom licenses for all 99 Neighborhood Councils.
- Removes the cost and administrative burden from Neighborhood Councils
- Ensures 100% operational continuity



Request 3 - 2027 Neighborhood Council Elections Outreach Campaign

- Covers essential outreach tools
- Multilingual, targeted outreach for 46 high-need communities
- Aims to increase candidate and voter turnout
- Strengthens the civic leadership pipeline in historically underrepresented communities
- Provides the essential, mobilized community network required to support Mayoral priorities

Budget Timeline

SEPTEMBER - NOVEMBER

City of LA department leaders submit their proposed department budget to the Mayor's office.

FALL

WINTER

NOVEMBER - APRIL

Department leaders, Mayor's staff, and staff of the City Administrative Officer (CAO) confer on each department's proposed budget.

JUNE 15T

City Council approves the annual city budget.

MAY

City Council Budget and Finance Committee holds public hearings to deliberate the budget.

APRIL

Mayor unveils proposed budget during the State of the City address.

JUNE 30TH
